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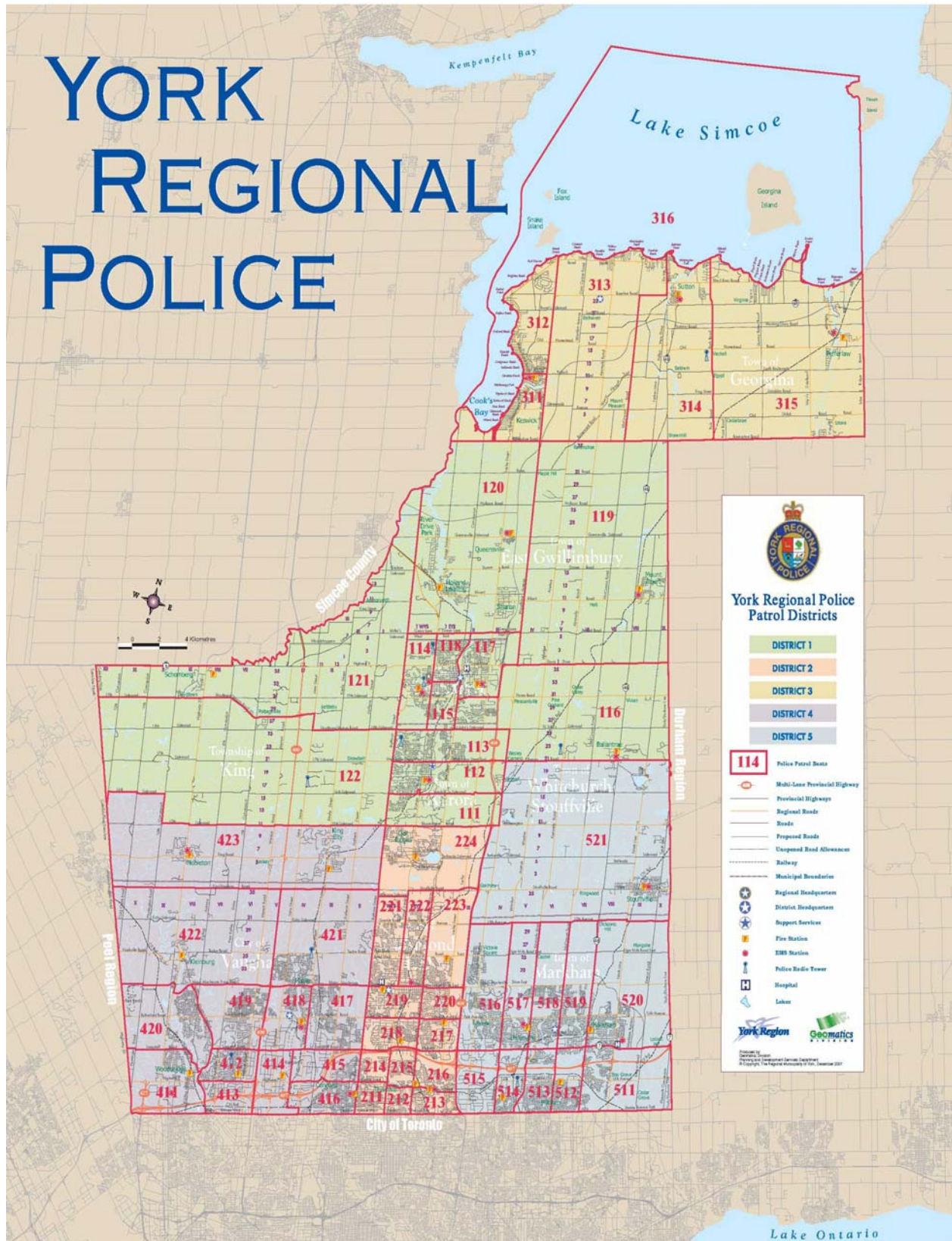

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# ABOUT THIS REPORT

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## IN THIS REPORT

This report contains a summary of crime statistics for York Regional Police pertaining to incidents reported between January 1<sup>st</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2007. A one year and five year comparison is made. Miscellaneous statistics are also included.

## HOW ARE CRIMES COUNTED?

York Regional Police publish crime statistics based on the number of reported violations (Incident-based Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)). Incident-based UCR classifies incidents according to the four most serious violations in the incident (generally the violations which carry the longest maximum sentences under the *Criminal Code*). Violent incidents (except robbery) are classified differently from other types of crime. For violent crime, a separate incident is recorded for each victim. Robbery, however is counted as if it were a non-violent crime in order to avoid inflating the number of incidents. In categorizing incidents, violent violations always take precedence over non-violent violations.

All data in this report is based on reported crimes and represents a “snapshot” at the time of extraction from the records management system at year-end. Unless otherwise noted, any updates or revisions to data for the years previous to 2007 are not reflected in this report.

## MAKING COMPARISONS

Unless otherwise noted, all crime statistics in this report are compiled using Incident-based reporting methodology. These statistics should not be compared with those provided by the *Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics (CCJS)*, a division of *Statistics Canada*, who converts the data received to an Aggregate-based UCR format which measures only the most serious offence related to an incident. In addition, CCJS includes the number of offences reported by the Toronto North Detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police with York Regional Police’s crime statistics.

CCJS data should be used for comparisons between policing jurisdictions because all data is compiled using the Aggregate-based reporting methodology.

## TERMINOLOGY

**Actual** totals include only those incidents for which an occurrence report was made and have been substantiated through police investigation.

**ATM robberies** include robberies at ATM machines within financial institutions or at stand alone locations where the victim is approached and forced to withdraw

money or is robbed as they are leaving the machine.

**Car Jacking** includes robberies where the intent is to steal a motor vehicle with the use of violence against the person(s) in care or control of that vehicle.

**Clearance rates** are calculated by the number of violations cleared by charge or otherwise (persons processed by other means) divided by the number of violations. These violations may not necessarily have occurred during the reporting period but some time prior.

**Crime rates** are expressed as a rate per 100,000 population using year-end population estimates supplied by York Region Planning and Development Services Department and have been rounded to two decimals.

**Criminal incident** refers to a set of connected events which usually constitute an occurrence report. One incident can include more than one violation.

**Demands for Service** occur when information is provided requiring a police response that generates an incident number.

**Deposit robberies** include robberies where a business deposit is stolen from a person using force.

**Financial robberies** include robberies occurring at banks, credit unions, or involving armoured cars.

**Hate Crime** means a criminal offence committed against a person or property which is motivated by the offender's bias, prejudice or hate based on race, national or ethnic origin, language, colour, religion, sex, age, mental or physical disability, sexual orientation, or any other similar factor.

**Home invasion** is an intrusion into a residence with the intent of robbing the occupants therein.

**Offence** is defined as a statistical fact for Aggregate-based reporting. This terminology is not used in Incident-based reporting.

**Retail robberies** include robberies occurring at retail or commercial premises including convenience stores, restaurants/fast food establishments, massage parlours, gas stations, and donut/coffee shops.

**Street robberies** include muggings and intimidation style robberies and all other robberies by force or threat of force that do not meet the criteria of any of the other categories.

**Violation** refers to a contravention of the *Criminal Code, Federal, or Provincial Statutes*.

**Young Person** refers to a person aged 12 - 17 years inclusive (*Youth Criminal Justice Act*).

**Youth** refers to a person under the age of 18 years.

**Youth crime** refers to the number of youths formally charged plus processed by other means for committing a criminal or federal offence.

## **TYPES OF VIOLATIONS: INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING**

**Crimes Against Persons** are crimes involving aggressive action (with the intent to do harm) or threat of such action by one person against another. These include violations causing death, attempt capital crime, sexual assault, assault, robbery and other violent violations, and violations/deprivation of freedom.

**Violations Causing Death** include murder 1<sup>st</sup> degree, murder 2<sup>nd</sup> degree, manslaughter, infanticide, criminal negligence cause death, and other related offences causing death.

**Attempt Capital Crime** violations include attempted murder and conspiracy to commit murder.

**Sexual Assault** violations include aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault with a weapon or cause bodily harm, sexual assault, and other sexual crimes.

**Assault** violations include aggravated assault, assault with a weapon or cause bodily harm, assault, unlawfully cause bodily harm, discharge firearm with intent, assault peace/public officer, criminal negligence cause bodily harm, and other assaults.

**Robbery and Other Violent Violations** include robbery, extortion, criminal harassment, uttering threats, explosives causing death/bodily harm, arson disregard for human life, and other violent violations.

**Violations/Deprivation of Freedom** include kidnapping (forcible confinement), hostage taking, and abduction.

**Crimes Against Property** involve unlawful acts with respect to property but do not involve the use or threat of violence against an individual. These include arson, break and enter, theft, have stolen goods, fraud, and mischief.

**Drug** violations include violations under the *Controlled Drugs and Substances Act* and the *Food and Drug Act*. These violations are comprised of possession, trafficking, and importation or production of various illicit controlled and restricted drugs.

**Weapons** violations include violations under the *Criminal Code* which involve any thing used, designed to be used or intended for use in causing death or injury to any person or used for the purpose of threatening or intimidating any person. These

include possession, use, trafficking, pointing, unauthorized import/export, firearms documentation and administration, and unsafe storage.

**Public Morals** violations include prostitution, indecent acts, production/distribution of child pornography, gaming and betting, and public morals.

**Other Criminal Code** violations include the remaining non-traffic *Criminal Code* violations that are classified as neither violent nor property violations. These violations are divided into two parts:

Part A: include bail violations, counterfeiting currency, disturb the peace, escape custody, luring a child via computer, obstruct, unlawfully at large, trespass at night, fail to appear, breach of probation, and threatening/harassing telephone calls.

Part B: include offences against public order, offences relating to terrorist activity, offences against administration of law and justice, invasion of privacy, offences against the person and reputation, offences against the rights or property, fraudulent transactions/contracts and trade, intimidation of justice system participant, wilful/forbidden acts/respect of certain property, offences related to currency, proceeds of crime, attempts/conspiracies/accessories, offences relating to criminal organization, and all other criminal code.

**Federal Statutes** violations include violations under all other federal statutes. They include the *Bankruptcy Act, Income Tax Act, Canada Shipping Act, Public Health Act, Customs Act, Competition Act, Excise Act, Immigration Act, Firearms Act, National Defence Act, Young Offenders Act, Youth Criminal Justice Act, and Other Federal Statutes.*

**Traffic** violations include all traffic violations under the *Criminal Code*. These include dangerous operation, evade police, impaired related violations, and other criminal traffic violations.

**Other Criminal Traffic** violations include fail to stop or remain and drive while prohibited.

## **CHANGES IN REPORTING METHODOLOGY**

On April 1, 2003, the *Youth Criminal Justice Act* (YCJA) came into force, repealing and replacing the *Young Offenders Act*.

On May 16, 2003, Mr. Justice Rogin of the Superior Court of Ontario released his judgment in the matter of R. v. J.P. and held that section 4(1) of the *Controlled Drug and Substances Act* (simple possession), as it applied to marihuana only, was invalid. Due to this ruling, police were thereafter unable to lay charges relating to simple possession of marihuana. On October 7, 2003, the Court of Appeal ruled that “the prohibition against possession of marihuana in s. 4 is in force” from that date forward.

On October 4, 2004, the Community Resource Centre (CRC) opened its doors at Hillcrest Mall in Richmond Hill. Motor vehicle collisions or minor offences, such as theft or damage under \$1000, can now be reported by either attending the CRC or reporting on-line via the internet.

In 2005, York Regional Police replaced the existing Records Management System (July 17<sup>th</sup>) and Computer Aided Dispatch (November 6<sup>th</sup>). This new application will accommodate the growth of the organization and meet legislative and reporting requirements. Included in the reporting requirements was the migration to the most recent version of the Uniform Crime Reporting Survey (UCR) 2.2. Although the principles are the same, there are some changes in scoring rules that may affect our 2005 crime statistics. Caution must be used when comparing these data with previous years.

In December 2006, Bill C-19 received royal assent amending the *Criminal Code* by making street racing an offence. To correspond with this, *Statistics Canada* implemented violation codes relating to dangerous operation while street racing. These violation codes fall under the Criminal Code Traffic category.

In June 2007, Bill C-59 received royal assent amending the Criminal Code to address the illegal recording of movies in theatres. To correspond with this, *Statistics Canada* implemented a violation code for the authorized recording of a movie. This violation code is included in the "Other Criminal Code" category.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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- 227,949 **CALLS FOR SERVICE** were received in 2007 compared to 224,992 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 2,957 calls or 1.3 percent. Based on the rate of Calls for Service per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 2.0 percent.
- 37,425 **CRIMINAL & FEDERAL** violations were reported between January 1st and December 31st, 2007 compared to 38,744 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 1,319 violations or 3.4 percent. Based on the rate of Criminal & Federal violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 6.6 percent.
- 6,465 **CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS** (violent crime) violations were reported between January 1st and December 31st, 2007 compared to 6,567 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 102 violations or 1.6 percent. The violent crime rate in 2007 was 657.64 compared to 690.77 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 4.8 percent.
- 8 **VIOLATIONS CAUSING DEATH** (Homicide and Criminal Negligence Cause Death) were reported in 2007 compared to 15 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 7 violations or 46.7 percent. Based on the rate of Violations Causing Death per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 48.4 percent.
- 12 **ATTEMPT CAPITAL CRIME** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 9 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 3 violations or 33.3 percent. Based on the rate of Attempt Capital Crime violations per 100,000 population, there has been an increase of 28.9 percent.
- 290 **SEXUAL ASSAULT** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 311 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 21 violations or 6.8 percent. Based on the rate of Sexual Assault violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 9.8 percent.
- 3,688 **ASSAULT** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 3,735 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 47 violations or 1.3 percent. Based on the rate of Assault violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 4.5 percent.
- 438 **ROBBERY** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 433 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 5 violations or 1.2 percent. Based on the rate of Robbery violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 2.2 percent. Car Jacking and Home Invasion incidents each represent 4.8 percent of the total Robbery violations. Street related

robberies during this period represent almost three quarters of all robberies (71.5 percent).

- 4,243 **DOMESTIC RELATED** occurrences (criminal and non-criminal) were reported in 2007 compared to 3,594 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 649 occurrences or 18.1 percent. Of the total occurrences reported, 30.9 percent resulted in charges, while no probable grounds for charges were found in 69.1 percent of the cases.
- **HATE CRIME** reported in York Region increased 32.1 percent in 2007 compared to the corresponding period in 2006. There were 74 criminal occurrences of hate motivated crime reported in 2007 compared to 56 in 2006.
- 23,204 **CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY** (property crime) violations were reported between January 1st and December 31st, 2007 compared to 24,403 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 1,199 violations or 4.9 percent. The property crime rate in 2007 was 2,360.39 compared to 2,566.92 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 8.0 percent.
- 1,828 **STOLEN VEHICLES** were reported in 2007 compared to 1,730 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 98 vehicles or 5.7 percent. Based on the rate of stolen vehicles per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 1.3 percent. Automobiles represent almost half of the vehicles stolen (49.7 percent) with Honda continuing to be the most common make (24.8 percent). Ford (18.5 percent) was the most frequent make of truck stolen.
- 4,671 **OTHER CRIMINAL CODE (INCLUDING WEAPONS & PUBLIC MORALS)** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 4,973 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 302 violations or 6.1 percent. Based on the rate of Other Criminal Code violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 9.2 percent.
- 2,695 **CRIMINAL TRAFFIC** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 2,818 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 123 violations or 4.4 percent. Based on the rate of Criminal Traffic violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 7.5 percent.
- 1,122 **IMPAIRED OPERATION/RELATED** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 1,089 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 33 violations or 3.0 percent. Based on the rate of Impaired Operation/Related violations per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 0.4 percent.
- 359 **DANGEROUS OPERATION** violations were reported in 2007 compared to 342 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 17

violations or 5.0 percent. Based on the rate of Dangerous Operation violations per 100,000 population, there has been an increase of 1.5 percent.

- **YOUTH CRIME** (the number of youths formally charged and processed by other means) in York Region decreased 7.8 percent in 2007 compared to the corresponding period in 2006. The number of young persons charged increased 2.8 percent while the number of youths processed by other means decreased 13.7 percent. The Youth Crime rate decreased 9.4 percent.
- The **CLEARANCE RATE** for Crimes Against Persons decreased from 83.3 percent in 2006 to 81.0 percent during the corresponding period in 2007. The Property Crime clearance rate decreased slightly to 37.6 percent in 2007 from 38.1 percent in 2006. The overall clearance rate for Criminal Code & Federal violations remained virtually unchanged, increasing slightly to 55.8 percent in 2007 from 55.1 percent in 2006.
- 16,711 **REPORTABLE MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION REPORTS** were processed in 2007 compared to 17,045 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 334 reports or 2.0 percent. Based on the rate of reportable motor vehicle collisions per 100,000 population, there has been a decrease of 5.2 percent.
- 24 **FATAL COLLISIONS** occurred on our roadways in 2007 compared to 30 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 6 collisions or 20.0 percent.
- 27 **PERSONS DIED** on our roadways in 2007 compared to 33 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 6 persons or 18.2 percent.
- In 2007, 194,384 9-1-1 calls were received in the **COMMUNICATIONS BUREAU** compared to 182,731 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 6.4 percent. The number of non-emergency calls decreased 0.6 percent (408,199 from 410,727). The total number of calls received increased 1.5 percent (602,583 from 593,458).
- **INFORMATION MANAGEMENT** processed 7,931 requests for motor vehicle collision/incident summary reports in 2007 compared to 8,474 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents a decrease of 543 requests or 6.4 percent. The number of police clearance letters processed in 2007 increased 2.1 percent from the corresponding period in 2006 (21,341 to 21,796) and the number of volunteer screening letters also increased 0.1 percent (21,762 to 21,774).
- During 2007, a total of 1,753 **FREEDOM OF INFORMATION** requests were received compared to 1,529 during the corresponding period in 2006. This represents an increase of 224 requests for information or 14.7 percent. Formal requests

increased 21.3 percent (194 from 160) and the number of informal requests also increased 13.9 percent (1,559 from 1,369).

- The **ALARM PROGRAM** saw a 10.2 percent decrease in alarm calls received (22,788 from 25,378) in 2007. The number of false alarms continues to be problematic with 99.4 percent of the calls being false. This increased slightly (0.5 percent) from 2006.
- Tips received by **CRIME STOPPERS** increased 4.7 percent in 2007 compared to 2006 (1,288 from 1,230). Arrests made as a result of Crime Stoppers tips decreased 40.0 percent (51 from 85). Property recovered increased 43.4 percent (\$262,824 to \$376,974).
- The **VICTIM SERVICES OF YORK REGION** program saw a decrease in on-scene occurrences (4.8 percent) while the number of telephone crisis calls/office visits increased 77.9 percent. In 2007, Female clients represented 68.7 percent of the total clients served while male clients represented 9.8 percent and children represented 21.5 percent.

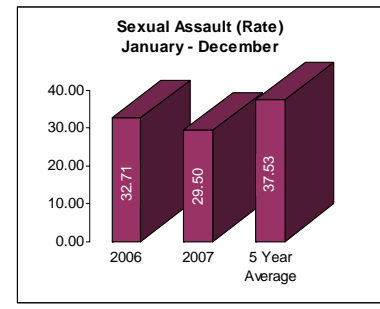
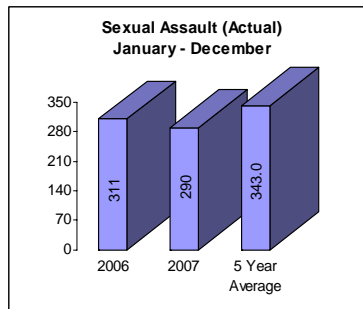


- All Violent Crime categories saw a decrease over the past year except Attempt Capital Crime.

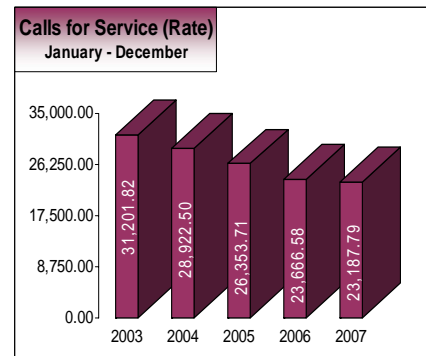
